The curriculum will include all normal subjects taught in a mixed modern school, but later it is proposed to teach a foreign language—probably French.

Pupils will be encouraged to remain at school after the age of fifteen and to take various courses leading to G.C.E. or other appropriate external examinations.

Provision has been made for the installation of television and radio at the school.

And there are no unsightly radiators or pipes in the hall. Instead, warm air from the oil-fired hot water heating system, is driven through concealed grills by electrically operated fans.

Two course meals can be ob-

tained at the school for 1s. a day. They are prepared in a fully automatic kitchen, which has a cooking capacity of 450 meals, by a cook supervisor and a staff of eight.

Adjoining is a washing up room with two deep sterilising cabinets and three sinks.

The school will have its own library—on two levels—medical rooms and rest rooms for girls.
